

METHAMPHETAMINE GRANTS
LAW ENFORCEMENT, PREVENTION AND EDUCATION

I. PREVENTION AND EDUCATION:

COMMUNITIES EMPOWERING YOUTH:

The Office of Community Services (OCS) is now accepting applications for funding from the Compassion Capital Fund (CCF) Communities Empowering Youth (CEY) program. The CEY program seeks to build the organizational capacity, sustainability, and effectiveness of experienced organizations working through community collaborations to reduce gang involvement, youth violence, and child abuse and neglect. OCS will award funds to build the organizational capacity of the lead organizations, their collaborating faith-based and/or community partners, and the resulting community collaborations to address issues facing America's disadvantaged youth and promote positive youth development. OCS anticipates making thirty awards of up to \$250,000 each per year. CEY projects last thirty-six months with three twelve-month budget periods.

CONCERN FOR HIGH RISK YOUTH:

The Tony Hawk Foundation was established to promote and provide funds for high-quality public skateboard parks throughout the United States. SUPPORT FOR NATIVE GRASSROOTS CAUSES:

Seva's Native American Funding Programs support local grassroots partnerships with Native American Peoples who have devised their own solutions in spiritual and cultural beliefs renewal, health and wellness renewal, environmental protection and restoration, and a variety of other areas. Small Grants are offered for programs that may otherwise be overlooked by larger foundations while the Continuing Grants Fund supplies three consecutive years of funding to assist in the development of organizational sustainability. HUD's COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM FOR INDIAN TRIBES AND ALASKA NATIVE VILLAGES:

Tribes and tribal organizations are eligible to apply and funds may be used to build new community facilities such as a Boys & Girls Club. Up to 15% of the total grant may be set aside for public service activities like youth development/crime prevention programming offered by the Club. www.naclubs.org

MEDICATIONS DEVELOPMENT OF THE TREATMENT OF AMPHETAMINE AND AMPHETAMINE-LIKE RELATED DISORDERS:

The purpose of this grant is to encourage preclinical and clinical research directed towards the identification, evaluation and development of safe and effective treatment of Amphetamine and Amphetamine-like Related Disorders, most importantly methamphetamine abuse and methamphetamine dependence. III. GRANTS FOR NEXT YEAR (FY 2007 Grants)

The following are annual grants from FY 2007. Look for these grants to be advertised again in early 2008 with applications due in the early summer.

ADMINISTRATION FOR CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

In FY 2007 the Administration for Children and Families sponsored the Targeted Grants to Increase the Well-Being of, and to Improve the Permanency Outcomes for, Children Affected by Methamphetamine or Other Substance Abuse. The grant program was expected to award 53 grants totaling up to \$145,000,000. Tribes and tribal organizations were eligible to apply.

DRUG FREE COMMUNITIES:

Drug Free Communities is a collaborative initiative sponsored by the Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) in partnership with the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). In 2007 the ONDCP expected to award about 60 new grants, totaling approximately \$6 million dollars.

ACCESS TO RECOVERY:

Approximately \$96 million was available to fund up to 18 grants in FY 2007. Award amounts will range from \$1 million to \$7 million in year one (for up to a 3-year grant period).

These grants will give States, Territories, and tribal organizations broad discretion to implement voucher programs to pay for a range of effective, community-based substance abuse clinical treatment and recovery support services. SAFE SCHOOLS HEALTHY STUDENTS:

The U.S. Department of Education's Office of Safe and Drug-Free Schools is seeking applications for fiscal year 2007 awards under its Safe Schools/Healthy Students Program. Eligible applicants are local education agencies and consortiums thereof. To be eligible, applicants must not currently have an active grant under this program. It is anticipated that 25 grants of up to \$750,000 to \$2.5 million, depending on the number of students served by the applying agency, may be awarded for a period of up to 48 months. SMART MOVES FUNDING AVAILABLE FOR 25 CLUBS:

Funding is available for the implementation and evaluation of SMART Moves programming for established Boys & Girls Clubs. SMART (Skills Mastery and Resistance Training) Moves is a nationally-acclaimed, comprehensive prevention program that uses age-specific modules to help young people resist alcohol, tobacco and other drugs and avoid premature sexual activity. BGCA will select 25 organizations to receive a \$19,780 grant from Phillip Morris USA over a one-year period. TARGETED CAPACITY EXPANSION:

Approximately \$8 million was available to fund up to 16 grants in FY 2007, with an average grant amount of \$500,000 per year for up to three years. The purpose of this program is to expand and or/enhance the community's ability to provide a comprehensive, integrated, and community-based response to a targeted, well-documented substance abuse treatment capacity problem and/or improve the quality and intensity of services.

Applications were accepted under four categories:

- 1) Native American/Alaska Native/Asian American/Pacific Islander Populations;
- 2) E-Therapy;
- 3) Grassroots Partnerships; and
- 4) Other Populations or Emerging Substance Abuse Issues.

Tribes were eligible to apply under all four categories.

YOUTH CLUB METH-RELATED PREVENTION AND EDUCATION GRANTS:

Youth gangs continue to have a significant harmful impact on youth, families, and communities across America. Leading gang experts and a growing number of communities have endorsed multi-strategy, multi-disciplinary approaches to reducing

gang activity. The OJJDP FY 07 Gang Prevention Coordination Assistance Program provides funding for localities to enhance coordination of local, state, and federal resources in support of community partnerships implementing two or more of the following anti-gang strategies: primary prevention, secondary prevention, gang intervention, and gang enforcement. **Deadline: June 22, 2007**
