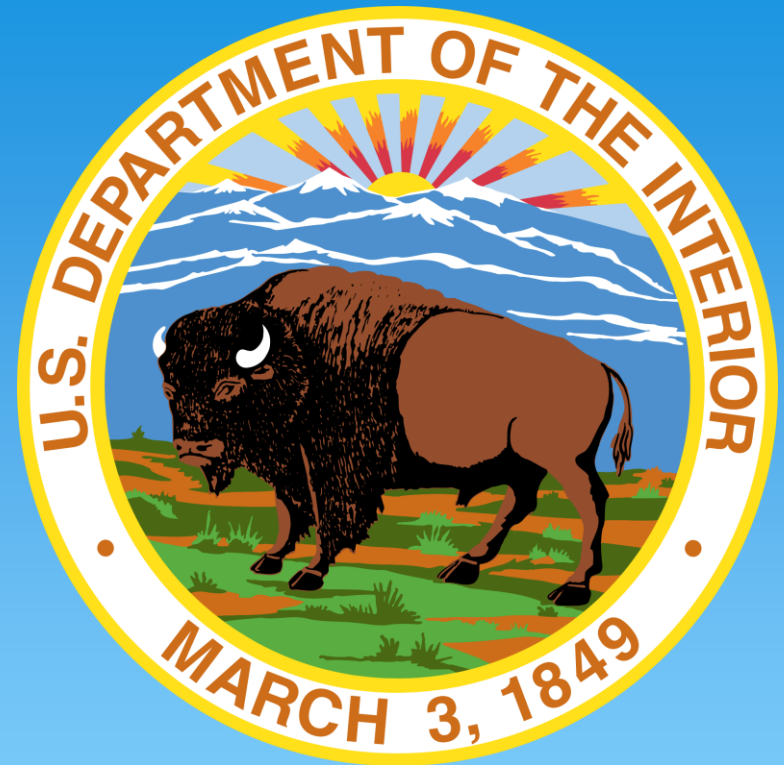

Bureau of Indian Education

- BIE promotes tribal nation-building and self-determination, empowers tribal communities, fosters tribal self-sufficiency, creates educational and economic opportunities, and preserves and fosters cultural heritage.
- In Elementary and Secondary education, BIE supports classroom instruction, student transportation, native language instruction, cultural enrichment, gifted and talented programs, and school maintenance.
- BIE prioritizes funding for core mission programs and operations at BIE-funded elementary and secondary schools, post-secondary tribal colleges and universities, and tribal technical colleges.

BIE continues to implement Priorities of the Assistant Secretary – Indian Affairs

- Priority 1 – Standardize Processes: Management & Workforce
- Priority 2 – Provide Quality Education Facilities for Indian Education
- Priority 3 – Ensure Safe Schools: Safety Inspections, Training and Crisis Management
- Priority 4 – Build Tribal Capacity: Link to Culture and Language; Kindergarten Readiness; Tribally-Controlled Schools
- Priority 5 – Standardize Process: Fiscal Oversight, Fiscal Monitoring, Workforce development and single Audits
- Priority 6 – Provide Quality Education for Indian Children: Behavioral Support
- Priority 7 – Standardize Processes: Greenbook Independence & Integration; Assumption of Facilities and Safety Responsibilities
- Priority 8 – Student Success: Standards & Assessment: Graduate Rates, Curriculum Standards and Instruction

BIE Strategic Direction

5-year Plan

- * The Core of this plan is to work collaboratively with Tribes, school boards, employees, and other stakeholders.
- * Involves a year-long process that included consultation with Tribes and critical stakeholders.
- * Set Milestones to identify successful programs from preschool through post-secondary education with individual schools' specific needs addressed.

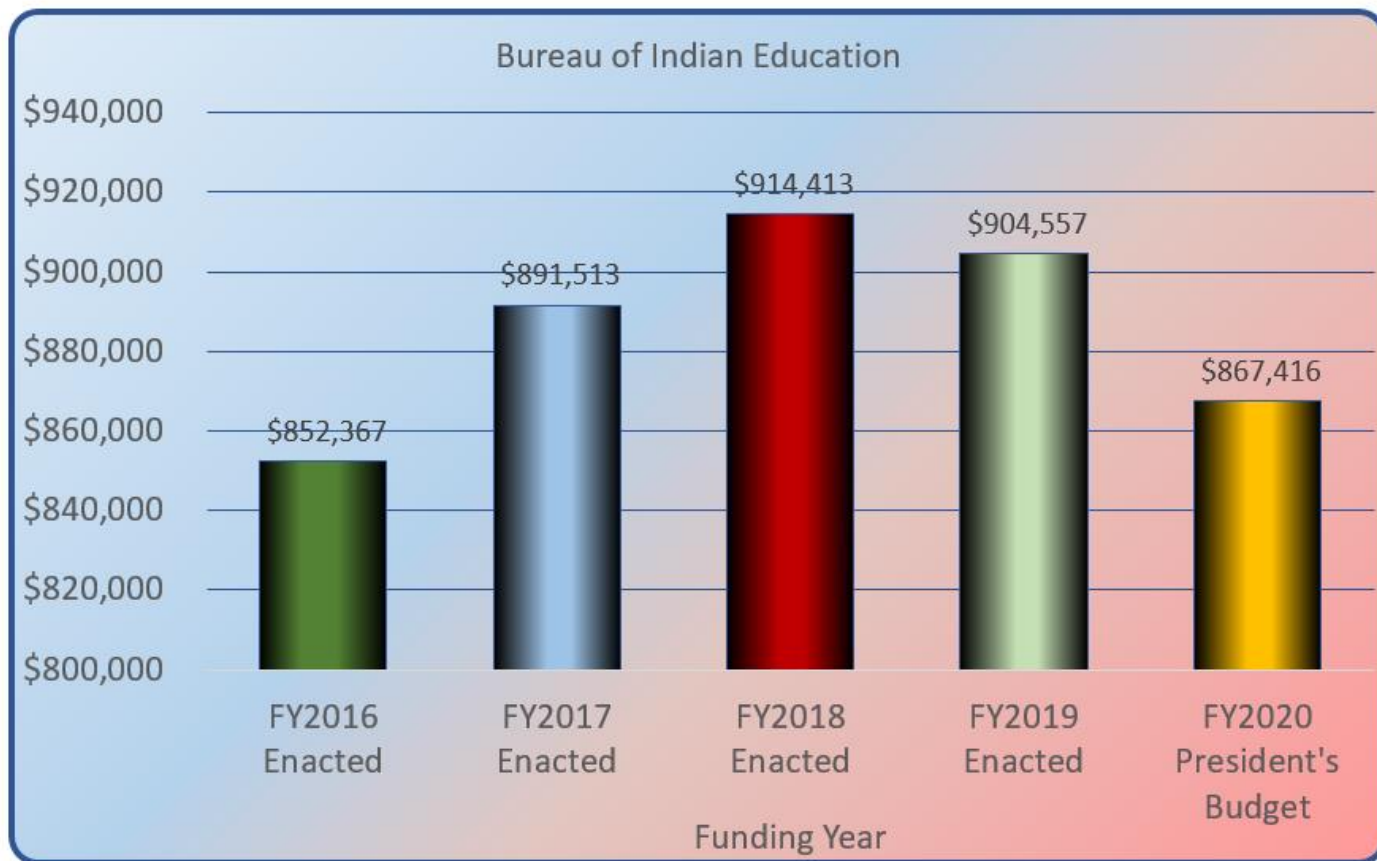
Goals:

BIE – An Independent Bureau

- **The new BIE Budget Accounts:**
 - (1) **Operation of Indian Education Program (OIEP)**
 - a. Priority is given to activities providing direct school operations and school improvement at BIE funded elementary and secondary schools, post-secondary tribal colleges and universities, and tribal technical colleges.
 - (2) **Education Construction**
 - a. There are five program lines under Education Construction.
 - b. FY 2020 budget activities will be used to improve the safety and functionality of facilities on school campuses; replace/build new teacher housing at remote locations; improve staff housing through major renovations; and, to continue efforts to abate environmental hazards following environmental laws and regulations.

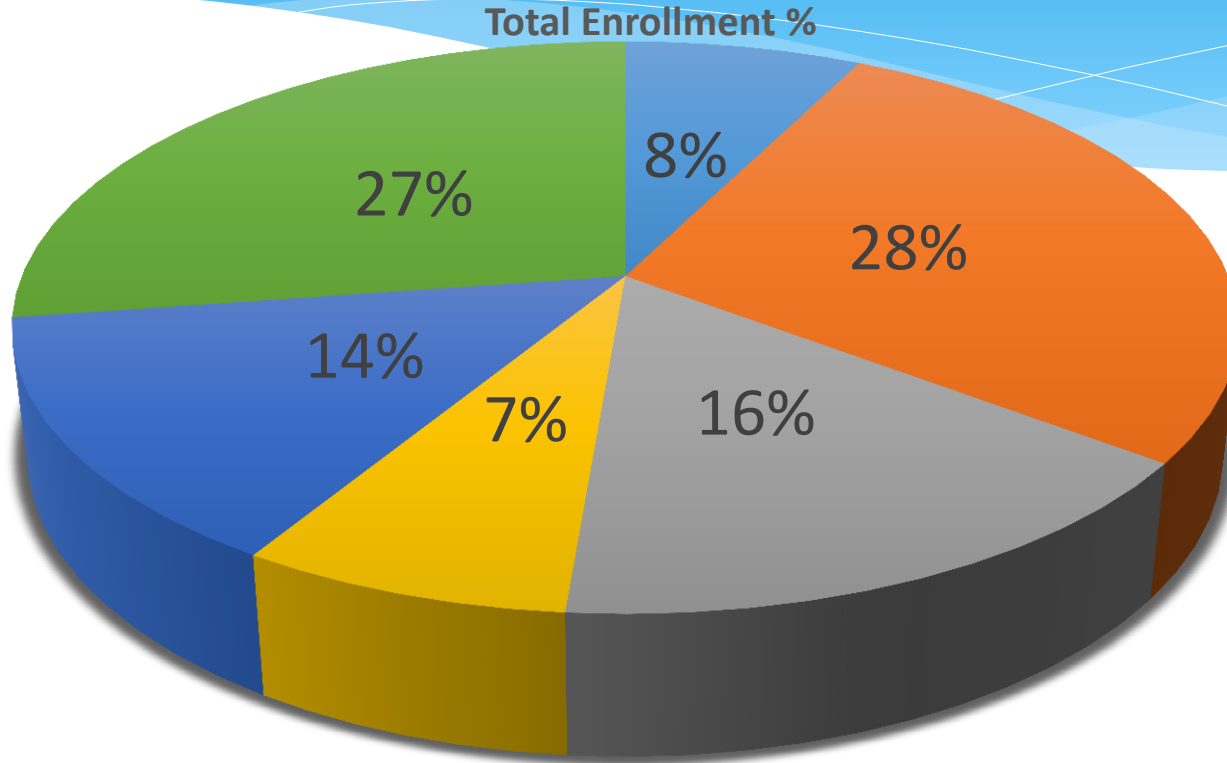
BIE Hiring and Vacancies

- BIE Staffing: 53.29% staffed, as of July 2019.
 - BIE Central Office: 80.28% staffed
 - School Operations: 24.11% staffed
 - Division of Performance & Accountability: 66.67% staffed
 - Bureau Operated ADD: 72.00%
 - Tribally Controlled ADD: 66.67% staffed
 - Navajo ADD: 89.29% staffed
- School Level Staffing:
 - Reformed requirements to make BIE competitive with public schools in the states BIE schools are located by changing policy to recognize and match BIE with state certification.
